New Aviation Security Measures for Carry-on Baggage at International Airports

To increase your safety, there are new rules for taking liquids, aerosols and gels on flights into and out of the South Pacific.

These new rules are needed to protect you from the threat of liquid explosives. They are in effect from 31 March 2007.

Each container of liquids, aerosols or gels in your carry-on baggage must be **100 milliliters or less**. All the containers must be sealed in a transparent, one-liter plastic bag. You are only allowed one plastic bag. Any transparent resealable bag of one liter capacity or less is allowed.

You may still carry on board prescription medicines. Baby products and non-prescription medicines that you need for the flight are also allowed. Proof of need may be required.

When you get to the screening point, you will have to surrender any liquids, aerosols or gels greater than 100ml that you still have with you, including duty free. The new rules also introduce random frisk searches as part of the screening process.

We recommend that you click on [Government Link](#) link and pack your bags in accordance with these new rules *before* you check-in. This way you will have time to put any containers that are too big into your check-in baggage.

Please Note: These restrictions do not apply to checked luggage.
